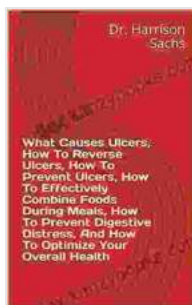


# Unraveling the Enigma of Ulcers: Causes, Reversal, and Prevention

Ulcers, also known as peptic ulcers, are open sores that develop on the lining of the stomach or duodenum (the first part of the small intestine). - Taking certain medications, such as aspirin, ibuprofen, or naproxen

- Proton pump inhibitors (PPIs), which reduce stomach acid production
- Histamine-2 receptor antagonists (H2RAs), which also reduce stomach acid production
- Antacids, which neutralize stomach acid
- Sucralfate, which forms a protective coating over the ulcer

In some cases, surgery may be necessary to treat an ulcer. Surgery is typically only recommended for ulcers that are large, have not responded to medication, or have caused complications.

There are a number of things you can do to prevent ulcers, including:

- Avoiding smoking
- Limiting alcohol consumption
- Taking medications as directed by your doctor
- Managing stress
- Getting regular checkups

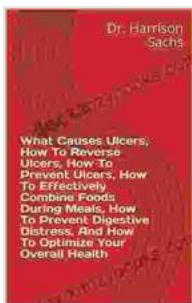
